STOCKTON PARISH COUNCIL - ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 2023

Villager of the Year - The Villager of the Year Award for 2022 was presented to Luke Cole to recognise his achievements as Chairman of Stockton Football and Cricket Club, including the development of new actitivities, "organising oneoff events such as the Jubilee and leading on the construction of the new changing rooms. Luke was congratulated by the Chairman and very graciously donated his £50 award to Stockton Playing Fields.

Financial Report - The Parish Clerk reported on the financial position for 2022/ 2023. Against a budget of £34,975 the final spend was £24,414. The underspending was mainly due to lower grass cutting costs in the dry weather last year, lower spending on village hall and parochial church council costs and lower repair costs. It is anticipated that the underspend will be used this year with increased energy costs, expenditure on reconstructing the path to the playing field and work on the new cemetery extension.

STOCKTON PARISH COUNCIL - CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2022-2023

Reluctantly the parish council has had to increase its precept (which is the money that is collected on our behalf through the council tax payments) by a significant amount this year due mainly to the increase in energy costs for street lighting. The yearly payment has increased from £2,000 to £6,200. Consequently the parish council has increased the precept from £26,500 to £30,000. So the parish council part of the whole council tax bill for a Band D property would be just under £53 p.a.

The parish council has continued to support two village groups with their plans for improving the facilities in the village. Stockton Football and Cricket Club have now completed the improvement of their buildings and the parish council's involvement has been as the prime tenant of the lease with Cemex and also as the body that all of the grants from Sport England have been made to initially. An enthusiastic Playing Fields Committee has now raised about £35,000 with another £10,000 promised, to be spent on new play equipment for the children of the village. This money will be spent in the coming year and further grants will be applied for to complete the overall project.

Last year I commented on two changes that might affect the parish council's relationship with the primary authorities at Stratford District Council and Warwickshire County Council. The first was the decision to change local ward boundaries and despite our objections to the Boundary Commission it decided to put Stockton in a new ward with parts of central and east Southam. The new councillor for this ward, Andy Crump, was elected last week.

Secondly the proposed merger of Stratford District Council and Warwick District Council did not go ahead apparently for reasons of due diligence when legal matters were explored. Consequently the parish council will continue to deal with Stratford for matters such as planning, waste and recycling, sport and leisure, etc. However despite the failed merger the long term local plans for Stratford and Warwick have now been combined in the South Warwickshire Local Plan. This plan will identify a growth strategy to meet the future needs for housing, jobs, infrastructure and open spaces until 2050. The Plan is going through a public consultation process that will continue until December 2025. The parish council has indicated in the latest consultation stage that it would not be averse to future housing development as long as there was some substantial, specific benefit to the local community such as investment in the building of affordable homes, improved village facilities such as the village hall and a turnaround point for the local bus service to avoid using Post Office Lane and High Street.

After several years of lobbying Severn Trent about the fragile state of the mains water supply in the village, they have finally committed to a programme of replacing the old water service so hopefully the years of water stoppages that we have suffered will be over.

Looking back to the parish council's action areas for the last year the results have been disappointing. The street lighting programme has been successfully completed and all the lights have been upgraded to LED lamps and the old concrete columns replaced.

A second action was to plant more trees around the village but this did not go ahead because insufficient volunteers came forward to look after the trees for their first couple of years. Thirdly the proposal to instal radar activated speed warning signs in Napton Road have been squashed by Warwickshire County Council who have a policy of only allowing such sites that they are fully funding and meet their criteria in terms of accident figures, vehicle density and speeds. In other words although the parish council is responding to pressure from parishioners over many years to do something about speeding and can fully fund the signs the County have decided that people have to be injured, perhaps seriously, before they will consider installation.

A further disappointment has been with affordable housing. Following the Housing Needs Survey carried out in 2021 the parish council was in consultation with Warwickshire Rural Housing Association to go forward with plans for a small development of 10 homes off Jubilee Fields. However, the Diocesan Office, who own the land did not wish to enter into discussions about releasing this land. The parish council has since heard that they are still considering plans to develop a larger site with one of the major house builders. The parish council will continue to work with Warwickshire Rural Housing Association to find other suitable sites for a small development of affordable homes for village people.

Turning to our action areas for this next year our first area is to investigate the strengthening of the grass verges in George Street that suffer from the effects of

vehicle parking. The parish council did instal some strengthening some years ago but this has not proved sufficiently robust and so the plan is to install a much more substantial grid system. The first stage is to hold discussions with Warwickshire Highways as the land is highway land and then to consult individual homeowners about the land outside their homes.

The second action is for the parish council to undertake some preparatory work to ensure that the new cemetery extension will be ready for use in the near future as the existing cemetery has little capacity left for full burials. This work might include a survey of the fencing and gates and strengthening of the entrance area. The third action will be to support the development of the children's playing field by resurfacing the access track from St. Michael's Crescent as the track gets very muddy in wet weather.

Finally I would like to express my thanks to the various people who have supported me in the past year, the Parish Councillors, the Parish Clerk and our County and District Councillors.

Verge by

Nelson's Way - the Estate Maintenance Company are responsible for keeping this tidy and will be contacted to carry out the work. Overhanging hedge in Napton Road - Warwickshire Highways will be asked to contact the householder about cutting back the hedge that obstructs the view of approaching cars. Safety of play equipment - the responsibility for regular checks of play equipment at the playing field will be discussed with the Playing Fields Committee.

Dear Garden.

I'm writing to say that I'm sorry that so much needs to be done, to my eyes you are looking overgrown and rather neglected. There are some good reasons for this. The main one is the weather, it has been cold and very wet. There were quite a few plants which didn't make it through the winter including Phormiums, shrubby salvias, hebes, cistus and dieramas. So there are gaps which rather look like they are being taken over by weeds especially cleavers (or do you call it sticky willy?) and also rosebay willow herb. Then there are the spaces left due to over enthusiastic removal of various plants which I'd begun to hate. The continuing wet weather has prevented any planting from happening. Then there are the rabbits which continue to dig around new plants exposing the roots, grrr. If/when the ground begins to dry out please rest assured that I, with the help of Sarah, will be doing our best to get rid of the weeds and get some planting done. There have been quite a few garden visitors who surprise me by making positive comments and help raise funds for the charity although I have had to deter a few people who have arrived wearing super smart 'town' shoes.

In the polytunnels it looks a bit more promising, everything is thriving, there is abundant growth, cuttings are rooting and seeds are popping up daily. Our next melee will on be Saturday 3rd June. Everyone is welcome – we will provide the boules and tuition in the rules.




STOCKTON'S WEATHER STATION





APRIL 2023 Headlines - With 43.5 mm the first April since 2018 to have "normal" rainfall. (2022 -11.5mm, 2021 - 28 mm, 2020 - 31 mm, 2019 - 17.5 mm, 2018 - 63mm) In April the average minimum temperature was 4.5 deg. C, half a degree above the average (4.0 deg. C.). The lowest temperature was -1.1 deg. on the 3rd. The average **maximum temperature** was 13.3 deg. C, about one degree above the average (12.4 deg.C.). The highest temperature was 18.8 deg. on the 29th April. Rainfall was 43.5mm, about 90% of the April average of 49 mm. The wettest day was the 10th with 9 mm. It rained on 13 days. Sunshine levels have been 1% above the average for April. Winds blew mostly from the south-west, south and south-east (16 days). Trivia of the month -April might have felt like a poor spring month but the statistics show that temperatures, rainfall and sunshine have all been in one with long term averages.

STOCKTON'S NEWS FROM THE PAST - A NEW SERIES

This series is based on newspaper reports from the 1800's and 1900's that shed light on life in Stockton. They are mainly from the Leamington Courier and Warwick Advertiser and are in roughly chronological order.

In those days, just like to today, newspapers survived mainly in a diet of scandal, death and disaster.

We probably find the language of that time as being arcane, pedantic, flowery and often patronising and the picture painted is of a life much harsher that we can hardly imagine nowadays.

From a newspaper report of August 1843 -

Tribute to the Memory of a Village Schoolmaster -

In our obituary of the present day we have recorded the death of Mr. John Cooper, a schoolmaster at Stockton in this County. He appears to have been one of those whose virtues will be long cherished in the memory of the living. The following communication is sent to us by a Correspondent of the highest respectability and a resident of the parish in which the now lamented Instructor lived and died.

"This young man who was suddenly cut off by scarlet fever, had acquired a considerable reputation by the zeal and assiduity with which he devoted himself to the duties of his calling, for which his attainments particularly qualified him; while the integrity of his character and the kindness of his disposition accured for him the confidence and respect of all who knew him. Both within and beyond the parish where he resided, his death has excited the deepest sympathy, which was most feelingly exhibited by all (and the number was considerable, including the Society of Oddfellows, of which he was a member) who attended his remains to the grave".

NOTE - John Cooper is commemorated on a plaque on the interior west wall of the Church.
