Sometimes, I'm asked to intervene in civil and private disputes and although I like to help, the council has little powers at times to intervene – I try to mediate whenever possible. People on social media often make uninformed assumptions and don't let facts get in the way of a good argument. Evidence is important when it comes to decisions, planning applications, allocations of funds etc – I've always be taught to never judge someone unless you've walked in their shoes. I work hard for our community but am old enough (and pragmatic enough) to realise that I won't be able to please all the people all the time, although I communicate as much as possible as well as regularly attending the Parish Council meeting and other events in the village.

Hedges, parking, planning applications and speeding - hot topics

This last month I've been trying to sort someone overhanging hedges (obscuring paths, rights of way,roads, signs,) as well as trying to deter some poor parking. Please remember that overhanging hedges etc impact residents with disabilities and sight impairments more adversely than other people – MANY ARE THE RESPONSBILITY OF THE LANDOWNER NOT THE COUNCIL. Some parking in the village leaves a lot to be desired, particularly obscuring views of people exiting junctions.

Last month, I continually pressured WCC to regulate contractors who put road closure signs etc in dangerous places, reducing visibility (Stockton crossroads was a prime example – I even got permission to move the signs myself). Cllr Warner and I also often liaise with WCC/Stagecoach to reduce disruption (caused by road works/closures) to bus routes/timetables in the village **Speeding/noisy motorbikes** – I am aware also that speed can be a factor in serious collisions, however there are many other factors too e.g. drink or drug driving, driving without due care etc..(see Fatal Four below)

Operation raises awareness of importance of passing horses wide and slow Ten per cent of drivers passed a horse and rider either too fast or too close is the result of an Operation Close Pass for horses that took place on Thursday 21 September 2023 on Smeaton Lane in Brinklow. This is despite the horse and rider duo being accompanied by a PCSO on a bicycle and all parties wearing hi vis.

The Operation was designed to actively target motorists who ignore Highway Code rules on how to safely pass equestrians on the road.

During the two-hour Operation approximately 45 vehicles passed a horse and rider (followed by a police cyclist equipped with a video camera) on Smeaton Lane to look out for motorists who passed them too fast or too close. Whilst the majority passed the horse and rider safely leaving at least 2metres and slowing to approximately 10mph or less, officers intercepted four motorists who did not comply with the Highway Code.

These motorists were pulled aside and given words of advice by officers about their driving and provided with information on the requirement, produced by the British Horse Society.

The Highway Code is now specific about what drivers need to do to safely pass horses:-

Slow down to a maximum of 10mph Be patient, and do not sound a horn or rev the engine When safe to do so, pass the horse wide and slow (2 metres minimum if possible) Drive slowly away

Warwickshire Police Rural Crime Team said "Our aim is to educate road users so they know how to safely pass horses on the roads. It's important the many equestrians in Warwickshire feel as safe as possible on our roads and we chose Smeaton Lane, Brinklow due to the many local horse riders who use it who have contacted us to express their safety concerns about vehicles passing them too close or too fast.

Although not in the Highway Code, we cannot stress enough how much the hi vis worn by the horse, rider and cyclist improved their visibility. During the operation we also visited stable yards to hand out high visibility tabards and Operation Snap cards to encourage riders to report moving traffic offences such as dangerous or careless driving to the police, plus information about The BHS Horse incident reporting app and Warwickshire Horse Watch.

Road Safety: Fatal Four (from last month too -still applies)

To help improve safety across the county, Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service is reminding people of dangers of the 'fatal four' behaviours behind the wheel - drink and drug driving, not wearing a seatbelt, using a mobile phone, and speeding.

A taxi driver licensed by Stratford-on-Avon District Council has been suspended for 14 days by the District Council's Licensing Panel, for failing to report driving convictions on his driver renewal application form.

The driver, licensed for 11 years, failed to inform the Licensing Authority of these convictions and did not disclose these convictions as required on two subsequent renewal applications submitted by him.

The convictions had occurred when the driver was not on duty as a taxi driver and although he had not been disqualified by the Court, a total of 12 points had accrued on his licence.

The District Council's Policy and Conditions for Hackney Carriage and Private Hire Drivers states: 'the proprietor of a licensed vehicle should notify the Council in writing of any conviction or caution recorded against him or of any penalty points incurred within 7 days of such a conviction being imposed.' The driver apologised and said he did not realise he had to notify the District

The driver was also issued with a Formal Written warning as to his future conduct.

Headlines - It seems to be a "No Summer" summer, but the figures show it to have been typical for August

The average minimum temperature was 12.6 deg. C, very close to the average (12.5 deg. C). The lowest temperature was 8.2 deg. C on the 5th July. The average maximum temperature was 22.6 deg. C, one degree above the average (21.6 deg. C) The highest temperature was 27.3 deg. C on the 10th. Rainfall, at 41 mm was only 63% of the average (65mm) and the wettest day was the 6th with 10mm. It rained on 11 days. Sunshine levels were close to normal recording 96% of the long term average. The wind blew mostly from the west and south-west (25 days).

Trivia of the month - no thunder recorded in August - the first time since 2013.

Does your garden look dreary through the winter months? Having a few splashes of colour can lift your spirits on dark days. I wouldn't be without Lonicera fragrantissima. This is a shrubby honeysuckle which has creamy scented flowers for weeks and attracts bees. Viburnum farreri 'Nanum' is a slow growing shrub with small pink flowers from mid to late winter. The shrubby wallflower, Erysimum 'Bowles Mauve' is a mass of purple flowers almost all year round. One of my favourite shrubs is Cornus alba 'Elegantissima', the red stems show up well from October til March. To see a wide range of colourful plants do try to visit places such as Anglesey Abbey in Cambridgeshire where there is a wonderful, much photographed winter garden.

One of my favourite roses here is one called Sally Holmes, she has masses of flowers and is completely disease-free. I intend taking lots of hardwood cuttings this month. Books tell you to dig a trench outside and put your 6-10 inch cuttings in it but it would get waterlogged so I put them in deep pots round the edge and keep them in the tunnel. They don't all root but any that do is very pleasing, I never get tired of propagating plants, it is so satisfying.

STOCKTON'S NEWS FROM THE PAST - NO.4 A TEMPERANCE SOCIETY

From a newspaper report of April 1883 - School Room - A large meeting was held in the above school room to start a branch of the Church of England Temperance Society at Stockton. The Rev W Tuckwell gave a very interesting speech in which he complimented Mr Tyrer, of Stockton House, for the very great zeal he took in the cause, as this meeting had been brought about entirely by him, so it was decidedly "his baby" and he (the Rector) was very pleased indeed to come and christen it. The Rev K Cox said he had great pleasure in addressing a few remarks to them with the object of starting another branch of the Church of England Temperance Society, he having started a great many branches in different counties, to cope with and defeat, as far as possible, a very great evil. He asked them to think how great an evil war was, but our war in the Crimea, great as it was, and expensive as it was, cost England 24,000 men and £120,000 a year and lasted two years. He said drink cost £147,000,000 in Great Britain and kills ten times as many a year as the Crimean War did. It exceeds all the money spent on bread, tea, cocoa, milk, sugar and rice. All were asked to help in the temperance cause, and the Church of England Temperance Society took all in from the highest in the land to the lowest, the Queen being Patron. The Rev W Tuckwell, in conclusion, said Mr Cox had given them a most practical, sensible and moderate lecture and urged upon the people to bring up their children in the temperance cause. Especially he liked the way Mr Cox dealt with the moderate section as there were a great many good men, not teetotallers, who would belong to a temperance section. He said if a working man had, say, two glasses of beer every day it would amount to about 1s. a week; that if, put in Government security, from about 18 years of age to 50, would secure an annuity of £25 a year for the remainder of his life. He (the Rector) said "Mr Tyrer is your president, and you could not have better, because he has not only the inclination but the will and time to bestow upon the work.". Mr Tyrer then stated that he had some cards for both sections and several joined the society and other names were obtained. Mr Tyrer, with his usual great kindness, invited visitors from the neighbourhood, Southam, Long Itchington and Napton to supper at his house and most of them availed themselves of his kind hospitality.

Stockton Football Club Team Photograph Stockton's News September 2023 Issue

The season was 1957 - 1958. Mr. W.H.C. Bicknell was Chairman and his younger son Malcolm was Club Captain. The year 1957 marked the 50th anniversary of the club winning the Garland Cup for the first time. This cup was won by Stockton in the two succeeding seasons and it was presented to the winning side to be kept by them in perpetuity. It is now the Stockton Charity Cup.

I think that the two people who cannot be clearly seen in the photograph are Geoff Eadon from Napton, half hidden by Joe Bennett (or is it Ivan Bennett?) and to Graham Hudson's right and Sid Biddle to Graham's left and in front of Les Hawker. Geoff played at left half and Sid played in goal. Standing between Joe Bennett and Keith Noon is Barry Tomkins, wrongly identified as Curly Noon.

The puzzle is why Joe Bennett is in the photograph. Bred and born in the village, in 1957 Joe was playing for Southam and Curly Noon was in the very good side that Warwick Town had at that time. Both of these superb footballers returned to play for their home village towards the end of their long and distinguished foot balling careers.


The team photograph was almost certainly at Lockheed, Leamington, where the Leamington and District League held their annual presentations. The actual date that the photograph was taken also presents another puzzle since Stockton had won the league the previous season 1956/57. I was serving Her Majesty from August 1957 for two years (National Service) and my own records are incomplete. The photographs in the present club house should confirm the cup Kangy is holding is indeed the Leamington and District League One Championship Trophy.

Who, what and where? Can you help?



Memories of Childhood from Mrs. Pam Noon recorded by Mrs. Irene Harkins and donated to Stockton's Archives.

Horace Neal (Non) lived for most of his childhood, by choice, with his maternal grandparents at Cali, together with his brother. Their parents had a large family of boys and girls and their father was among the cement workers who, living in a 'works house' went on strike for more pay and better conditions, but he was spotted by the employer holding a banner (union) and was sacked and turned out of the house the next morning with his family and furniture on the street. The family had to move often before eventually settling in School Street. Mrs. Pam Noon (nee Neal) was born at No7 George Street (her Grandmothers house). The rent was 5s10d. a week then. They had to move from there after her grandfather's death as nobody living there worked at the works. They moved into The Square and the rent for that house was 8s6d. They later bought the house and it was named 'Glendene' Pam's middle name. When Pam was 18yrs her parents got permission to use their house for a Post Office and became Postmaster and Mistress. Doctor Smorfitt used a room there one day a week for his surgery. The house had no bathroom and Pam, like many others in the village used the baths at the Nelson Club for 2d.

Pam attended a Secondary School in Leamington and caught the train from Stockton Station (a mile from the village) costing $7\frac{1}{2}$ d per day and any change was spent on a lollipop or sweets from a shop near to the school. Pam also belonged to the GFS (Girls Friendly Society run by Miss Pride (the then Vicars sister) and Miss Rita Rawbone. The meetings were held at the Co-Op 'room' which is now the workshop of Lawrence Neal - Chairmaker in High Street. Pam remembers every May Day that girls had a new summer dress to wear and children went 'Maying' around the village. This was the spring version of carol singing. Pennies were given and shared between the mayers. There was always a dance around the Maypole in the school playground on Mayday. The rectory lawn being used for country dancing displays by the school children at Church Fetes.

The doctors held a surgery at a house in Victoria Terrace and if you had to have a medicine he dispensed it if he had it with him otherwise you went to the chemist at Southam. You paid the doctor if he had to call at your house. He sent a bill. People, if they could, paid into sick-clubs, or unions, to ensure that they could afford to be ill before the NHS was born. Most children were born at home.

The Vicar at the time, used to let those inclined to perform, use a circular walled lawn at the Rectory for an outdoor theatre in the summertime. These amateur productions were always well supported and enjoyed.

When someone had a pig killed children would wait for the bladder to be inflated and used for a football. Many of the village children would swim in the canal near to where the 'Ladder Bridge' in the warm water that came from the 'arm' at the cement works. Some even set Eel lines there and caught their supper too!

Some enterprising talented villagers, of all ages, had formed a Concert Party and called themselves 'The Dominoes'. They performed for various charities all around the local area. They raised money also towards the cost of a new Chapel Sunday School building. Mr. 'Non' Neal opened the new building in the early 1950's, but unfortunately, lived only a few years afterwards. The building was demolished in early 2002 when the Methodist Chapel land was sold for building. The biggest single landlord of houses in the village in the 1920's was Nelson's Cement Company. They had built 4 streets of houses for their workers. These were tied cottages and were only allocated to the cement works employees. Rents were low, so were the wages, although the gardens were large. Therefore, after a gruelling day of manual work, a man could come home and relax by double digging his garden!





Ricks on Fire 23rd October, 1931

On Sunday evening two clover ricks belonging to Mr. R. Tuckey were discovered to be on fire. They were stacked near to the main road leading from Rugby to Southam on top of Stockton Hill. The blaze lit up the surrounding country and was seen from many miles round, and this brought to the spot, in addition to the villagers, many hundreds of people by motor and on foot, and the main road was lined with them. Southam Brigade came on to the scene, but after taking water from a pit on Mr. T. Tuckey's farm adjoining, they thought it useless to continue their efforts as the fire was too advanced and was left to burn away. It is believed that the ricks were accidentally set alight by picnickers.

September, 1938 Fifty Years Ago From 'The Birmingham Post' September 9th 1888 Mr. Tuckwell's Allotments

Mr. Tuckwell the well-known Rector of Stockton, near Rugby, held yesterday the first annual gathering of the tenants of his allotment farm. Two years ago Mr. Tuckwell, than whom the agricultural labourers of England have no more firm and courageous friend - in spite of the bitter opposition of his Bishop, but generously aided by the patrons of his living, the Fellows of New College, Oxford - split up his glebe lands amongst the labourers of his parish. It was an interesting experiment, tried under very advantageous circumstances. Mr. Tuckwell's tenants enjoy the advantage of scrupulously fair rents, absolute fixity of tenure, and a kindly and public-spirited landlord. The experiment seems to have been crowned with complete success. Eighty acres are now occupied by allottees. The land, which was formerly in a neglected condition, has been brought into a high state of cultivation. The tenants appear to be more than content. It is said that they are able to provide their families by the sale of what they do not require themselves to pay their rent and make a small profit. Mr. Tuckwell himself declares that a labourer can cultivate as much as two acres of land in his spare time, and by that means add five shillings a week to his scanty wages may be the social - aye, and the moral - salvation of many an agricultural labourer. Mr. Tuckwell has already written an admirable pamphlet on the allotments question: we should like him to write another setting out the statistics of his first year's operations. In the meantime, his many friends in Birmingham will heartily congratulate him upon the first results obtained from his thoughtful and generous experiment.


