# STOCKTON PARISH COUNCIL - DECEMBER 2023 MEETING

These notes are informal. For a full record please refer to the authorised minutes on our website.

County and District Matters: Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service consultation - the service are proposing a reorganisation that would increase the availability of fire engines when they are most needed. The Southam Station would remain open but would be manned by full-time fire staff 8am - 10 pm and then covered by other appliances based elsewhere. The consultation will run from December until March 2024. A public meeting is being arranged at The Grange, Southam on 27 February 2024. Details of the meeting will be made available in the New Year. The County have approved a 20 MPH speed limit on the main road through Southam. Next year's WCC Budget - the County will not be declaring bankruptcy like some other authorities but the council tax increase will be higher than previous years.

Village facilities: George Street Verge Protection - this work has been completed and has been paid for out of Councillor Andy Crump's delegated highways budget - many thanks to Andy. The parish council will now consider ways in which the rest of the verge can be dealt with. Village grass mowing the three year contract for the village mowing including the playing field and the cemetery has been open to tenders and closed on 31 December. The council will now appoint a contractor. Street sweeping - now that all the leaves have fallen WCC will be asked to send in their street sweepers. Volunteer Drivers Scheme - the parish council has agreed to join the Southam Transport Scheme that can take residents to medical appointments at a cost to the user of 45p per mile. Details are elsewhere in the magazine.

Parish Council Budget for 2024/5 - Expenditure for the current year is expected to be in line with the 2023/4 budget but the energy prices for street lighting have, as yet, not increased to the level that the council was advised, so the parish council will keep this under review. It was agreed that the precept (which is the amount collected by Stratford on our behalf) should be increased by £1,000 from £30,000 to £31,000 to take account of inflation in prices and represents an increase of approximately 3.3%. In 2023/4 we were 36th highest out of 86 parishes and this should not change very much.

#### **JANUARY 2024 MEETING**

These are informal notes only, for formal record please refer to the authorised minutes on our website.

County and District Council Matters: Stratford Council have approved in principle the use of hydrotreated vegetable oil (HVO) for use in their refuse collection fleet and will establish a trial period. Stratford Council's increase in the Council Tax for next year will be 2.99%. As reported in the December magazine the County are consulting on changes to the way that the Fire and Rescue Service uses staffing resources. A rural service like ours had traditionally relied on volunteers (on-call staff) but in recent times the availability of these volunteers for call out has reduced particularly during the day when most of the incidents occur. The proposal locally is that the Southam Station will be fully staffed between 8am and 10pm and at night any incidents will be dealt with by back-up (surge) stations, such as Rugby and Leamington. Villagers are encouraged to make their views known through the consultation process that runs until the 10th March 2024, on the WCC website and accessing "Resource to Risk". The parish council accepted the Chief Officer's conclusion that their proposals were the best solution to a difficult decision.

Planning Matters: (23/02911) The Crown Inn, new retractable canopy permission refused. The Parish Council disagrees with this decision by the planning officer acting under delegated powers, the reasons given that the extension was a discordant addition to the building and would cause unacceptable harm to the character and appearance of the area. Up until now with minor planning application like this the parish council, when asked for its views, has generally commented "No Representation" rather than support or object. If it had made a "support" decision in this case then the application would have gone before that Planning Committee where a range of views could have been expressed. In future when the parish council is asked for its views it will give more thought to each case and attempt to reach "support" or "reject" comment. National Planning guidelines support "decisions that create conditions in which businesses can invest, expand and adapt", and also enable "the retention and development of community facilities such as public houses". The parish council's view is that these national polices were not given enough weight in reaching the decision.

**Grass Cutting Contract:** The parish council recently sought quotes from contractors for its grass cutting contact to cover the next three years and has awarded the contract to Frank Mann. The council would like to thank Gary Farmer who has fulfilled the previous contract.

**Southam Council Voluntary Drivers Scheme:** the parish council now contributes to this scheme that arranges transport for medical appointments. Contact 01926 814004 for details.

**Community Orchard Fund:** the parish council was invited to apply for a grant to set up a community orchard but this was declined because no land was readily available and community support was not apparent.

Climate Emergency Policy: the parish council is aware that it has become fashionable for other councils to adopt a climate emergency or net-zero policy but agreed that it had made a significant contribution by converting all its street lights to low energy LED lights, and that various other bodies already provide a wide range of advice on reducing people's personal carbon footprints. It decided no further action was needed.

Reminder of the Month: Please don't take grit form the roadside grit bins to use on your property - they are for use on the highway.

Stratford-on-Avon District Council's Cabinet approves use of alternative fuel for refuse vehicles On Monday 15 January, Stratford-on-Avon District Council's Cabinet approved in principle, the use of hydrotreated vegetable oil (HVO) for the refuse collection fleet.

The change is subject to the approval of the 2024/25 Revenue Budget, with the expected additional cost of changing to HVO being up to £250,000 a year Everyone Active - which runs Stratford Leisure Centre, Southam Leisure Centre, Shipston Leisure Centre, Studley Leisure Centre and The Greig Leisure Centre in partnership with Stratford-on-Avon District Council - has put together its top hacks to help you get active.

Following last week's floods, Stratford-on-Avon District Council would like to thank everyone who came together to monitor and provide a response to a rapidly changing situation.

The effects of storm Henk on already saturated ground led to widespread surface water flooding across the district with some roads impassable.

The District Council is also advising all those affected by internal flooding to report this using a dedicated WCC website link.

Throughout the incident, officers from the District Council maintained a watching brief working with Warwickshire Resilience Forum, a multi-agency partnership including emergency services, local authorities, the Environment Agency and utility providers.

Once the water receded, the Forum moved into the recovery phase and partners are now working through a programme of street cleaning, removal of debris and gully jetting.

Members of Warwickshire Resilience Forum are in the process of contacting households, commercial premises and landowners known to have been affected by flooding to ensure they are aware of the services and assistance available to them.

If your home has been affected by flooding during Storm Henk (2-5 January), it's important that you report it to Warwickshire County Council and to your insurance company.

Report this via Warwickshire County Council's <u>Flood Risk Management online</u> tool .

Reporting flooding to the County Council may help secure Government funding to help you recover from the effects of the flood, and will help local authorities plan future flood prevention measures. Warwickshire has not yet reached the required threshold of 50 properties confirmed as flooded, to be eligible for this Government funding, so it's crucial that you report flooding to help us secure this support for you.

#### FLOWERS FOR FEBRUARY

Most of us will be looking forward to the spring, we've had enough of the winter wet and cold so anything which will make us feel cheerful will be welcome. Snowdrops, hellebores and early daffodils will be most commonly seen. Primroses and violets look wonderful grown together and multiply easily. Slightly more unusual are some of the winter flowering shrubs. Viburnum botnantense 'Dawn', V. tinus and Lonicera fragrantissima are all likely to flower right through the winter. Hazel catkins are developing at this time of year and look good in a vase with daffodils. To see a much wider range take yourself to any of the botanic gardens where there will be an abundance of winter colour.

Now is a good time to buy seed potatoes and onion sets. Sow sweet peas and broad beans in cell trays and put out of reach of hungry mice. Towards the end of the month you can start to cut down any ornamental grasses and other herbaceous plants. And prune dogwoods by removing two thirds of all stems to the ground.

The average minimum temperature was 4.4 deg. C, exactly on the average (4.4 deg. C). The lowest temperature was -3.5 deg. C on the 30th November. The average maximum temperature was 10.1 deg. C, just below the average (10.2 deg. C) The highest temperature was 13.5 deg. C on the 18th. Rainfall, at 63.5 mm was 95 % of the average (67.5mm). It rained on 14 days. Sunshine levels have been 30% higher than the long term averages. The wind blew mostly from the north west, west, and south west (23 days).

Trivia of the month - only 8 Novembers have been sunnier since local

# records began in 1894.

#### **DECEMBER 2023**

Headlines - a mild, wet and dull month.

The average minimum temperature was 4.5 deg. C, about two degrees above the average (2.2 deg. C). The lowest temperature was -3.5 deg. C on the 3rd December. The average maximum temperature was 9.3 deg. C, again about two degrees above the average (7.5 deg. C) The highest temperature was 12.9 deg. C on the 21st. Rainfall, at 117.5 mm was more than 80% higher than the average (64.5mm). It rained on 19 days and the wettest day was 3 December with 23mm. Sunshine levels have been only about 53& of the long term averages. The wind blew mostly from the south west, west, south and south east (23 days).

The year started with an exceptionally dry and sunny February but March brought a change with a dull, wet month with snow on the 8th,9th and 10th making it the wettest March since 1947. By May a high pressure system had established itself off the north of Scotland bringing a dry but cool spell. A spell of 30 dry days from 11 May until 10 June ended with 53mm of rain on the 11th. July and August didn't feel like summer months but September was a definite improvement and was sunnier and warmer the July or August. While storms and floods affected much of the country in Stockton in October we managed to escape with a typical autumn month. November was one of the sunniest on record but December ended the year with dull, wet weather that resulted in the highest annual rainfall since 2012 locally.

# Stockton and I By Victor Neal 1896 -1978

Part Three

Well, father met my mother out that way, they married and Wal was born, and he brings the family to Stockton. His father, ensconced at The Wharf, was running several boats on the canal, providing extra horses for working all those locks up to Hatton, where I understand he had another stable to house them pending their hire in the opposite direction. If you are no boatman, this service was called for by the fact that the boats usually ran in pairs, which could be managed by one horse comfortable enough over the longer pounds, but where the locks were close and numerous – and at that time they accommodated only one boat at a time – it would have been a tremendously time-consuming task to keep coupling and uncoupling the horse at each lock. I believe that at this same time he was sub -contracting for some of the haulage for the canal's great competitor-to-be, the railway branch line being constructed not much further from one side of his house than the canal was on the other. All this enabled him to find employment for more than his own family, and this latter finished up pretty substantial, too: ten boys and two girls. Let's check them: Albert, Fred, Tom, Wal, Arthur, Alfred, Charlie, Jack, Frank and Bill, Harriett and Carrie. Too numerous for me to be sure, off-hand, of their correct order, but ten sons of course not losing their name on marriage, and some of them having big families too, it becomes easy to understand the predominance of the Neals in the village where there were none of that name until my grandfather's arrival from Banbury. We must closely rival the Bicknells (one of whom Neville married) who had the advantage of being mentioned in that old book my friend Sam Warner lent me to peruse – The Stockton Award – a delightful manuscript of the time of land enclosure, which after several evenings' swotting nearly got me on my head, and puzzled my wife who was too sane to study it, until, in spite of my struggles to locate at least one of the fields, long before the paragraph ended I had lost whatever its beginning was about, and retired beaten. I did manage to gather that the gentlemen responsible held their meetings at 'the house of John Jones known by the name of the sign of the Griffin in Southam, etc', and that there were Bicknells in the village in those days.

I wouldn't suggest for one moment that Neville was deliberately motivated by the fact, but his marriage was quite a strategic move in this numerical rivalry, depriving the Bicknells of one member and at the same time adding one to the Neals. Between them they have added another – little Lawrence James.

Mavis, our daughter, unable through no fault of her own to add to the Neals of

Stockton, takes herself off to Broadwell two miles away to see what she can do for the Faulkners, and her little Neil (still doing her best for the Neals, you see) Byron is no sooner born than he gets himself, photo and all, into the local paper, being the fifth generation of living Faulkners.

But we are wandering away from my grandfather at The Wharf – and here I'd better say that strictly The Wharf is just outside our parish, the boundary post appearing to give us just a slice of the garden, in fact it is often known as Birdingbury Wharf, which may confuse you, especially when I tell you its fourth name after my uncle Tom took over, when it became known as Mary Ann's, a tribute to his wife and my aunt who was another good'un, and could throw a dart or turn a domino with the best.

My grandfather did some rash things besides establishing the Neals so securely in the district (not that I'm saying that was bound to be a rash thing), for instance there was the occasion of the 'outride' (I've never learnt whether other districts knew their travellers, particularly brewery travellers, by this name, but we locally did) on one of his visits. These visits seemed to be known or sensed in advance, for a crowd usually gathered, in part for the fun generally expected, and perhaps in greater part because it was apparently the custom for the 'outride' to stand drinks all round.

Anyway this freezing morning was putting a thin skimming of ice on the canal when the gentleman arrived. 'A pound to the first man to cross,' he cries. 'Now, Tom, my lad.' Tom, my lad, my grandfather, without a second's hesitation plunges in and across. Old 'Baggie' Paine, odd-job man, who was usually close on my grandfather's heels, didn't break his rule here. Instantly he followed, maybe half dutifully and half expecting his reward too, in which respect he knew he was seldom disappointed.

My father used to tell of the dreadful occasions when Gramp was forced to dress up for some special event. If ever there was one thing that exasperated him, it was those vexing non-slip ties in those daft high starched double collars. The number he had angrily torn to pieces and flung on the fire! and the number of unnecessary words torn to pieces at the same time!

I get mixed up as to whether it was my grandfather or uncle Fred – they both achieved some weight-lifting renown locally – who would stand in a bushel measure and get a half-quarter of wheat on his back – 252 lbs or 2½ cwts – and no hand-hold on the stuff in a sack; I've tried it, have you? I often think this sort of thing was the last remnant of the days when we (and I'm using this in the past tense) used to amuse ourselves by swankingly running up and down the granary steps with half-quarters on our backs in a good healthy competitive spirit with each other. It seems to make our modern amusements – radio, TV, etc – very feminine and tame, doesn't it? I don't think my ten stones advocate a return to such a drastic

alternative now. No, personally, I prefer jogging along on an old push-bike. My grandfather belonged to Banbury and I should think a slice of Banbury

belonged to him. For we must have been in the money in those days. I gather he owned quite a number of canal boats and had the bulk of the coal business in the town. Some great-aunt of mine – her name slips my mind, which it didn't ought, for it was a good old-fashioned name – was reputed to own practically all of Grimsbury (an area of north Banbury) at one time.

My father's uncle Jack, my Wharf grandfather's brother, came into the bulk of his father's business, I suppose, and report had it – in fact one of the old Banbury gentlemen told me himself – if ever a man painted a town red, he did. Must have the smartest, high-stepping trotters in town; he finally stepped so high and painted so red that the town couldn't hold him and he went off to America or Canada. The last rumour we heard was that he had turned over the proverbial new leaf and was doing well.

My father was advised at one time to go and spend a few days with them in Banbury to consider a job in the business. He was told, 'Just the man we want, one we can trust. We've got some good chaps, but they are too honest. You can make a bob or two for yourself and a bit for us as well,' by the simple expedient, it was explained, of carrying two weight-tickets, one something under the ton, which would be correct, the other something over the ton. 'But be sure you remember which pocket each is in. If you are pulled up, of course give them the right one, but once in the cellar, you're safe: there's usually a heap left and noone can check on it.'

To my father's everlasting credit, he refused both this offer and the high-stepping and town-painting temptations which had been exhibited, perhaps as ground bait, so lavishly to him, and hastened home (not that I have ever heard that there was any dishonesty in my great-grandfather's time).

This coal episode makes me chuckle afresh to remember a kindred affair, over which we chuckled plenty at the time. One of our local coal merchants brought his horse-drawn

vehicle into the Blue Lias Inn yard, another canal-side inn again about half a mile from the village on the Long Itchington side, which was then kept by my uncle Fred or (I can't be sure) his widow Ada, who kept it from after his death to her own. Their son, my cousin Fred, happened to be in one of the stables and, peeping through the window, saw the coalman remove several lumps of coal from each of the five sacks he had left and hide them under his heap of empty sacks. Now our coalman was generally liked but also generally suspected, and again generally fond of a pint or so, so this could be a very tempting situation. As the coalman goes in for his drink, Fred dashes out and drops the coal he had hidden over the nearby yard wall just to make sure his mother had full weight when she bought the five cwts.

His mother, suspiciously wary too, and knowing nothing of Fred's contribution, bluffs the coalman by telling him she can manage for coal this time, but some boat-woman had asked her to get 5 cwts for her, to be tipped near the canal. 'Make sure,' she says, 'she's got her weight; she's awfully fussy and is bound to weigh it to make sure.' This must have had the desired effect and convinced our dealer in coals, temporarily at least, that honesty is the best policy

for, wiping his mouth, he comes out and surreptitiously searches his heap of empties for the missing lumps, sending Fred into ecstasies at the stable window by his bewilderment. Fred steps out then and says, 'What're you looking for?' but he only gets a muttered answer about thinking a lump of coal had rolled that way, and our puzzled dealer had to take his chance and tip his five sacks just as they were.

That's jumping ahead again, though, so back to my great-grandfather, which is about as far back as we can go at present. I have threatened that if ever these days of hurrying-to-no-effect leave me time, I might do a bit of research amongst the registers, etc, in Banbury town, which could be an intriguing pastime.

On my mother's side I can say much less. The way of things so often tends to the ladies drifting, particularly on marriage, away from their home quarters, and my mother was no exception. She began as Sarah Jane (Jenny) Terry, out Wolverhampton way, I rather think Bilston, then Willenhall; four or five sisters and brother Joe, who could quote his Shakespeare to suit all occasions and had an excellent voice, according to my mother. I believe he must have died as a young man, and I never met him, but I did meet two of the sisters. My aunt Florrie we knew best as she often visited us; on the other hand mother and I visited aunt Emily twice at Stafford. I remember the first time as a boy of ten or twelve being somewhat bewildered, for apparently mother had not notified auntie of our intended visit in time to get a reply before we were on the way. My aunt had been carrying on her late husband's bakery business at Penkridge, and I remember my mother's blank look when she saw another name over the shop, but luckily the new people could tell us aunt's new address in Stafford, not many miles away, so all was well. Mother's parents must have died pretty young, too, as we children never knew them.

To get back to Stockton, my mother had migrated as a children's nursemaid through several places to a family at Polesworth. Barker must have been the name of the people, for she used to tell us of the times she had overheard the village maidens' stage whispers, 'There's that Barker's wench.'

The Rev Canon Trotter married my father and 'that Barker's wench' on March 25th 1891 and they lived at a house in Cockspur, a part of Polesworth, I gather so named from the renowned old cock-fighter, Billy Gilliver who lived or had live there. Speaking of a part of Polesworth makes me wonder if strictly I should have said that the canal-side house where the Crowshaws reared my father so well was situated at Glascote. (Between Polesworth and Tamworth)

On coming to settle in Stockton, my parents with baby Wal, it appears, spent a short time with my uncle Fred, at that time living in a house about a mile from the village across some fields, until they got hold of rooms with the Smiths and, upon the latter's demise, took on the whole house wherein Ern and I were born and which, after renting it from Mr John Cleaver of the Barley Mow, they finally bought on their landlord's death.

# STOCKTON'S NEWS FROM THE PAST - NO. 7 - DROWNING IN THE CANAL

From a newspaper report of November 1864 - Coroner's Inquest

An inquest was held at the King's Head, Napton on Wednesday before Mr W Henderson, Deputy Coroner, touching the death of George Hales, a native of Stockton.

After viewing the body the Coroner took the evidence of John Keen who identified it as that of George Hales of Stockton, labourer, aged about 44. William Chadwick, boatman, said that on Monday afternoon, November 24th, he was steering a boat on the Oxford Canal, and, when passing under a bridge called Coventry Bridge, near the Napton Junction, he saw in the water the body of the deceased and afterwards, on getting assistance, they drew it out. William Shelton, labourer, said he was in the company of the deceased at the King's Head, Napton on the 7th November last (day of the South Warwickshire election). They had some conversation and some beer together. Deceased was hard up and asked witness to buy a shirt, which he declined to do but he gave him 6d for a slop. He saw deceased buy a loaf and eat the greater part of it. He told witness that he should drown himself that night. He heard deceased talk of his wife and heard him joke about his wife living with another man. He went away about nine o'clock, but did not seem much the worse for beer. Thomas Hales, labourer, Stockton, said deceased was his younger brother. He was married but had lived apart from his wife for some years and had led a wandering sort of life. Witness had only known him return to this neighbourhood on three occasions during the last six years.

Richard Shelton, a labourer, produced a cap which he found on top of the bridge on the morning of the 8th and similar to the one the deceased had worn. It was generally supposed that the deceased committee suicide, but as there was no evidence as to how he got into the water a verdict of "Found Drowned" was returned
