STOCKTON PARISH COUNCIL - JANUARY 2025 MEETING

These are an informal notes only, for a full record please refer to the authorised minutes on our website.

County and District Council Matters: Government Proposal for Unity

Authorities - The Government want to replace the two tiers of local council (County and District) with a single (Unitary) authority by 2028. Warwickshire have put in a bid to government to combine the five District Councils in the county into one and to be in the first round of the new councils. It is not clear yet whether this will include having an elected Mayor. **The South Warwickshire Local Plan Preferred Options Consultation** is now live and will run for a period of 8 weeks, until Friday 7 March 2025. This can be found on the SWLP website.

Village Facilities: Village Hall Broadband - the parish council has come to an agreement with the Village Hall Committee and Stocktons News to fund the installation of a broadband service in the Hall. The installation costs will be born by the Committee and Stocktons News and the monthly rent charge will be paid by the Parish Council. This will allow the Council to access relevant documents during council meetings and give all village hall users the benefit of broadband access.

Climate Change Community Fund: the parish council will support the Village Hall Committee's bid for a grant to install solar panels at the hall. **Street light in Post Office Lane:** the old fashioned street light is no longer working and cannot be converted to LED lamps - as there have been complaints about the level of lighting in Post Office Lane the parish council will ask its contractor to replace it with a modern steel column as part of its programme to upgrade all lights. **Small cameras** have appeared on telegraph poles and lighting columns in the village and the parish council will find out who was responsible and what purpose they serve.

Stockton Crossroads: Cllr Crump and Cllr Warner had a meeting with WCC Road Safety staff over the recent crashes at the crossroads. Major alterations such as an island or traffic lights were rules out on cost grounds but discussions are ongoing over improvements to signage, etc.

Parish Council Precept: the Precept is the money that is collected by Stratford on behalf of the parish council to pay for the services it provides in the village such as grass cutting, street lights, cemetery, etc. The parish council decided to keep the precept of £31,000 at the same level as last year, which means our part of the Council Tax for a Band D property would be about £53.60 pa.

Villager of the Year Award: the award for 2024 will be advertised asking for nominations for 2024 with a deadline of 28 February.

Moan of the Month: Dog mess has been left along the edge of Memorial Green - please clean up after your dog.

News From Andy Crump

Last month, Cllr Warner, a resident and I met WCC to discuss the situation at the crossroads – I've agreed to help with some more road markings. The only real long-term solution will be traffic lights, the WCC officer said that any roundabout (including mini) would not be appropriate. I and the PC will seek funds for the lights, which are likely to cost run into 7 figures.

I've been producing these weekly updates for nearly 5 years now and I'd like to think that my posts are informative and presented in a non political and non self promoting way (you may disagree) but I do get annoyed when people take credit for other people's work or go to a photo opportunity, when they have had very little input (into the subject). Some people would go to an opening of an envelope if the press was there, whereas I have the perfect face for radio.

My other pet peeve is when councillors, utility companies or developers etc say something that is totally different to my recollection – those who know me would say my memory is pretty good (especially if I am owed money ha ha !) – I was once told I was good listener too. I've have had several examples of it this over the past few months when to quote the late Queen 'recollections may vary' – I then do further research (and sense checking with other people/councillors) and it subsequently transpires that my recollections were far more accurate than theirs. I often think of the parable of Doubting Thomas at such times.

Review of 2024

Another busy year dealing with lots of calls, emails, Facebook messages from how is Aldi doing, to potholes, overgrown paths, flooding, speeding, ASB, neighbour problems, roadworks etc. This year I've often helped to pin down and hold to account organisations such as the National Grid, STW, broadband contractors, Mobile phone network providers and the Primary Care Trust, all of which can be tardy in replying to residents' concerns on a wide range of issues, Like most years, I've often been approached by several residents in various places (shops, pub, on dog walks and at meetings) for my views, opinions and information on a wide range of issues – dog walks, in particular, can take longer than anticipated.

I've regularly attended Stockton and Napton PCs, Lower Shuckburgh gathering and Southam Town Council Meetings, as well as numerous community events. At all, I've provided some sort of comprehensive update.

Many local organisations have benefitted from my Cllr Community Budget in 2024 – Southam Swimming Club, Stockton Lunch Club, Southam Community Minibus, defibrillators at Southam Cricket Club and Napton Garage, Southam Community Business Group, Lower Shuckburgh Community Bench Fund, Southam Town Play areas, Southam Vision Support, Graham Adams Centre.

I've also managed to use my Highways Budget to improve several footpaths and highways areas throughout my ward (i.e. Southam, Stockton and Napton). Also many areas have had foliage cut back (by me or the council), road signs cleaned or made visible as well as many road marking being refreshed etc.

Certainly been a busy year and I feel I've tried to make a positive contribution to our community, so I was annoyed by the paragraph below.

Recently, a friend sent me a copy of a recent post on FB of someone saying that I – along with others- was not 'fit for purpose' -, that someone was a person I had tried to help (over 3 years ago) – what was posted was not true and there are 2 sides to a story. I had arranged for appropriate authorities to investigate and give advice, which wasn't necessarily followed. It was a civil case and when my advice didn't align with their views, they became uncivil in my opinion – it was a good job I didn't publish some of the emails (which I obviously won't btw) as they would shed a different perspective on it. At the end of the day, I've been a SDC Cllr nearly 13 years and a WCC one nearly 8 years and if I get retired by the electorate at a future election, so be it. I do remember the phrase that the grass isn't always greener on the other side and be careful what you wish for.

Local Government Review/Devolution (Government decision due late Jan/early Feb – after publication of Feb's Stockton News)

The leader of WCC has decided, after listening to a range of views, to write to the Minister for Housing, Communities and Local Government. This is to signal willingness to be considered for delivering local government reorganisation and devolution in keeping with the Government's ambitious timeframe and recognising that, consequently, the Government may decide it is necessary to postpone the May 2025 County Council elections.

WCC now awaits the Government's response which is anticipated to be received by the end of January. When WCC receives that response, I hope it will be clear on timescales and next steps.

I will share that information as soon as I have it and as such, I anticipate my next update, on this subject, will be to confirm whether or not the Government decides to postpone the May '25 elections.

I, for one, recognise that we are in a period of uncertainty and that there will be concerns around what the future may hold. While the Government has set out its ambitions, it is early days and very much business as usual as WCC continues to deliver for its residents and communities as always.

Regardless of whether Warwickshire is in the priority programme for Devolution and Local Government Reorganisation, it is clear that the next few years will bring significant change. I know that as always, Warwickshire County Councillors will continue to put the interests of residents to the forefront, and will meet challenges head-on.

Winter Fuel Allowance (WFA) – residents are aware of my opinions around its removal for most. Whilst I accept that some people who got it, didn't really need it, there are many just over the qualification limit who lost it and really need it.

Recently, I helped such a resident (who had lost their WFA) with a claim for **Attendance Allowance** and this week that person informed me that the claim had been successful and it would be backdated until November, as well as receiving a

weekly amount. If anyone wants to know more about this and **Pension Credit**, please get in touch with me.

FEBRUARY

STOCKTON'S WEATHER STATION



STOCKTON'S WEATHER STATION - NOVEMBER 2024

Headlines - two weeks of very dull, dry weather without a glimpse of the sun, called anti-cyclonic gloom here, but the German's have a much better word - dunkelflaute.

The **average minimum temperature** was 5.2 deg. C, just less than one degree above the average (4.4 deg. C). The lowest temperature was -2.3 deg. C on the 17th November. The **average maximum temperature** was 9.6 deg. C, just below the average (10.2 deg. C) The highest temperature was 15.4 deg.C on the 24th.

Rainfall, at 61 mm was 90 % of the average (67.5mm). It rained on 8 days and we had one day of snow, the 19th. **Sunshine** levels have been 10% lower than the long term averages. The **wind** blew mostly from the south west, south and south east (23 days).

STOCKTON'S WEATHER STATION - DECEMBER 2024

Headlines - the dullest December since 1989.

The **average minimum temperature** was 4.4 deg. C, about two degrees above the average (2.2 deg. C). The lowest temperature was 0.3 deg. C on the 28th December. The **average maximum temperature** was 9.0 deg. C, one and a half degrees above the average (7.5 deg. C) The highest temperature was 14.5 deg.C on the 1st. **Rainfall**, at 78 mm was more than 20% higher than the average (64.5mm). It rained on 19 days and the wettest day was 28 December with 27mm. **Sunshine** levels have been only about 46% of the long term average.

Trivia of the month - there were no air frosts in December 2024, the first time this has happened since 2015.

A TOPSY TURVY YEAR

The year started with one of the wettest Februarys on record, although it was extremely mild. March continued the pattern of mild, wet weather but the end of April made it the coldest end to the month for 33 years. May was a dull month that may have felt cooler because of the lack of sun but it was milder due to higher overnight temperatures. With 360mm of rain, the first five months of the year have been the wettest on record. June brought the first taste of normal, sunny, summer weather that continued into July, but we did experience some isolated days of very heavy rain. August restored some of balance with only 25% of average rainfall but September was the wettest since 1883 (122mm fell between 21st - 26th). While storms and floods affected much of the country, in Stockton in October we managed to escape with a typical autumn month. November and December fell into a pattern of dull, windless days that kept temperatures above normal. The total rainfall for 2024 of 795mm is the highest since 2012 when it reached 912mm.

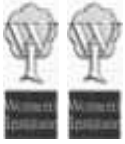
We are hoping to have broadband and Wi-Fi installed soon and will keep you updated with progress.

We would love to hear your thoughts on other activities we can hold at the Village Hall - please let any of the Village Hall Committee members know.

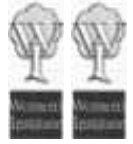

Stockton's Archives

STOCKTON AND I

The autobiographical writings of Victor Neal (Part 13)

Mr Harold Blythe, who seemed to have the cement mills under his jurisdiction, and was referred to by the older workers as 'the little tayman' (Stockton for 'tea-man'), having been amongst the tea plantations in Ceylon, was reputed to have himself sunk £10,000 in the New Side, and already it was superseded by the Rotary, which always made me think of the American tales of tipping a pig in one end a machine and it coming out as sausages at the other.

Certainly our stone that *Gamecock*, *Niras* or *Jurassic*, with our help, were trundling up to the works, was tipped into the crusher, passed to the wet mill, to the slurry-pits, pumped into Rotary itself and in short was untouched by hand until drawn from those sleeves for dispatch by canal, rail or road; which was astounding to us who remembered the hoards of men who had been employed with wheelbarrows to link its separate processes.

So many wheelbarrows the firm owned that practically every married worker of theirs had one at home 'borrowed' for the garden. As the return of these was not covered by the rules of borrowing, the firm would periodically send Ben Cooksey with the horse and cart down to the village to collect them up. I imagine that GB, the boss, wasn't ignorant of the fact, either, that he could also have collected loads of shovels and various other tools from the hovels of his houses, for a large number of these bore the stamp 'CN', which stood for Charles Nelson. It would have been a more difficult task to have recovered the firewood that on the homeward journey occupied the space vacated by the eatables carried earlier to work in the flag-baskets. I have often thought he was well aware of these goings-on and perhaps permitted the practice to compensate for his low rates of pay. He won a half-hearted strike or two attempted to better that famous 3½d an hour; perhaps there was a better side to him. These economic references indirectly remind me to say something of my spare-time activities about these times.

Jack Berry had a liking for the oddities that were just up my street and we became bosom pals. He was a year my senior and I accepted his leadership; he led us cross-country to Ladbroke for point-to-point races, heading on a direct line for the tents visible in the distance. He taught me the pleasures of cycling and mended punctures in record time; he led me one night down to Ern Russell's yard, silently by the

hedge-side, having caught sight of Ern's son – the same Frank to whom I had handed my May Queen and my own May Kingdom in our schooldays – moving about the lighted stable bedding down the horse. Frank momentarily left the building and Jack without a word, his hand on my arm, glided us inside the stable by the light of the hurricane lantern on the floor, behind a partition four or five feet high which formed a hay pen. By this time Frank was back and foddering and grooming unsuspectingly; I almost gasped as he flung his hayfork over our partition, luckily missing us. When he finished his jobs, picked up his lantern and made for the door; I was wondering what Jack's game was and visualising us being shut in for the night. The door was one of those in two halves and Frank was just closing the top half when Jack in a deep sepulchral voice says: 'Open that door!' 'Eh?' very startled from Frank. 'Open that door and ruddy quick,' and quick as we scrambled, the hurricane lamp in Frank's hand was vanishing in the house door up the yard, which must have been remarkable time for thirty yards or so for an untrained man lacking modern technique and electric timing.

Jack and I didn't dare to tackle the length of the yard and the probability of running into Frank's father, and dashed the other way and – serves us right – blundered into the butcher's 'sockage' up to our ankles, over the hedge and across the field on to the Napton Road. Cleaning our boots on the long grass, we wandered back to the village as unconcernedly as possible, by the butcher's shop where Frank was near the gate and excitedly told us the mysterious adventure that befell him! I don't think he ever found out who it was and how they got into the stable under his very nose. But I do not that after twenty years in France Jack at last visited us, tapping on the door, opened it and said in a sepulchral: 'Open that door,' and I knew he was the same old Jack.

Well, amongst other oddities, Jack had a go at tattooing. If I were to grub around amongst my odds and ends, I could still find a few of those little handbills of his: 'By careful study of the above I can now classify myself as a tattooist,' I remember they began. I don't have to grub around for another reminder of this line of his, a reminder I can't lose even should I wish to: Buffalo Bill indelibly etched by Jack himself on my right forearm, in colour too. Jack also carried an apprentice effort or two of mine on his own arms. Our old friend Bob Lickorish, though, was our best practice target; Jack and I working simultaneously, one on each arm, Jack outlining with the machine whilst I filled in the colours with the bunched hand needles. We all three used enthusiastically to plan that crucifixion scene for Bob's chest, but it never came off (or on), for Jack had another odd idea about that time and got himself into the Royal Army Medical Corps. Before he needed to have done, too, for that was in 1913, which timing made him one of the Old Contemptibles of the following year.

On enlisting, Jack turned over the whole tattooing business – machine, transfers and what-not, including what were left of those handbills, which I had to overprint with a rubber stamp with my own name – to me, so I in my turn ‘I now classified myself as a tattooist,’ and had so many clients that – what sticks in my mind – in some weeks I earned more in this spare time job than the 11/- or so I got from Nelson’s Klondyke. At the same time I gathered – I am reminded by a glance at my hands in the act of writing – a few odd marks from the times I forgot to test the machine before filling with the ink.

Soon after this tattooing, or perhaps mixed with it, we were back to our conjuring, brother Ern now having developed enthusiasm in this line and rousing me afresh to act as his partner, for he had greater ambitions here than I, and visualised a professional act to carry us on tour of the music halls. Ern knew that we must crawl before we ran, must curb our impatience, and practise and practise. We occasionally took a day or half day from work and gave a children’s show at neighbouring schools, at Grandborough and Cubbington, I remember.

This had a romantic fascination for me and I would have liked to wander the countryside for a spell, earning a living in this way which I believe would have been reasonably possible, but the lure of those limelights was tempting my brother on to the next rung. We must give a show for the grownups. We did so at Birdingbury, enlisting the aid of Henry Baldwin, the ‘Balancing King’ and Wal (Polly) Windsor as our comedian. We became the Lenneaux Company instead of the Lenneaud Brothers, and were invited to give a command performance at Stockton Rectory for the Rector and choirboys. Ern prepared for the next rung and made sketches for a grand illusion or so to be developed for this next step, and here I get rather hazy as to why our exuberance waned at this stage. Perhaps performance found that such a fog had arisen that the mysteries and vanishings seemed likely to continue. About halfway home we all dismounted for a smoke and in the process of lighting up and joking about, lost our bearings so not one of us knew which way we’d come from or which way to go. It was thick. After some consultation I estimated that if the side road was the one I thought it was, there should be a yard wall opposite, so we fumbled around and sure enough located it. We would be able to verify our direction if in a few hundred yards we found we were running down Snowford Hill; this proved to be so, and we got home safely.

While our ardour for magic was at its height we considered adding fire-eating to our repertoire and, procuring the necessary equipment, retired to the parlour to practise. I couldn’t possibly convey the coughing and spluttering, choking and spitting this involved: one had to stuff some protective material containing the smouldering ingredient in one’s mouth and blow out the sparks and fire. In theory, that is; but

whether we Lenneaud Brothers lacked talent in this line or the stamina for sufficient practice, after an hour or so we decided it was the wrong idea and the wrong place to practise – a decision our mother was happy to agree with – and we retired beaten.
